I-CAN is a model for clinical practice and education that enhances health care experiences, improves population health outcomes, and reduces health care system costs for disadvantaged patients, families, and populations. Neighborhood Collaboratives for Academic-Practice Partnership (NCAPPs) coordinate academic programs, community services, and health care delivery to advance



# Populations \_\_\_\_\_

I-CAN works in neighborhoods with disadvantaged and underserved populations including low-income individuals and families, homeless, elderly, veterans, mentally ill, seasonal farm workers, and immigrants and refugees.

#### **Socially Determined Health Instability**

The clients involved with I-CAN experience social determinants of health instability.

44% of clients lack a primary

care home

37% of clients lack stable housing

27% of clients lack health insurance

57% of clients visited the ED at least once in the six months prior to I-CAN. 18% visited three or more times.

### Care Coordination

Partner agencies identify clients and connect them with interprofessional teams of students from the Schools of Dentistry, Medicine, and

Nursing, and the College of Pharmacy. Under the supervision of a nursing faculty-in -residence, the teams collaborate with clients to set goals and address social determinants of health.




### Evaluation \_\_\_\_\_

#### **Short-Term Client Outcome Measures**

Increased number of clients with health insurance, primary care homes, & stable housing.

#### **Long-Term Client Outcome Measures**



Reduced EMS calls, ED visits, and hospitalizations, and increased satisfaction with health care services.

#### **Student and Team Outcome Measures**

Increased satisfaction with working in interprofessional teams and with interprofessional team-based decision making and collaboration.

#### **Establishing Health Equity**

Social determinants of health that perpetuate instability, encourage overuse of system resources, and lead to high system costs affect underserved populations in Portland and Medford, Oregon. Interprofessional team-based and client-centered care effectively addresses these issues. I-CAN interprofessional student teams provide care coordination to improve health outcomes and satisfaction with health care services while lowering costs.

This work aligns with Oregon's health care reform efforts and OHSU's commitment to educate a collaborative workforce to meet the needs of an evolving health care system.
